Speech sound production (Pronunciation)

Information and advice for parents, carers and professionals from CSH Surrey Early Years Speech and Language Service

What are speech sound production skills?

A child's ability to produce the correct consonant and vowel sounds in the correct order in words and sentences. Speech sounds in children develop gradually from birth until about 8 years.

How do speech sound production skills develop?

Children develop these skills over their preschool years. To pronounce words accurately underlying skills including adequate hearing, attention and listening and vocabulary knowledge are required.

Generally it would be expected that by:

2 $\frac{1}{2}$ **-3 years:** Children will be understood by their main carer.

 $3\frac{1}{2}$ years: Children will be understood by familiar adults (e.g. nursery staff). Developing 's' and 'f' production.

4 years: Children will be understood by unfamiliar adults. Consonant blends such as 'sp', 'tr', 'cl' are often not accurate until children are 4 years old.

Children using a lisp for 's' is common up to 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ years.

The 'ch', 'th', 'r', 'l' and 'j' sounds are often not perfected until children are school-aged.

Difficulties with speech sound production skills

Children are described as having either a 'speech sound delay' where they are making mistakes which are normally seen in younger children or a 'speech sound disorder' where their errors do not match the normal developmental pattern.

Activities to develop with speech sound production skills

- Play listening games where your child must indicate that they can hear the difference between a word they are trying to say and the incorrect word they say instead.
- If your child says 'tea' when they are trying to say 'key' stick a picture of both items to the wall and ask them to run to the one they hear. You may need to give them clues to start with e.g. an action alongside the word.
- Make a bag of items or a scrapbook of pictures that all start with the sound your child is having problems with. The adult should name them to help the child to hear the correct pronunciation. E.g. "sock", "seal"...
- When working on a particular sound start practicing first with the sound on its own, then with a vowel, then in words and sentences e.g. 'sss', then 'sea', then 'sun', then 'yellow sun' etc.

Strategies to promote speech sound production

Ensure your child has had a recent hearing test. Your GP or speech therapist can refer him/her for this.

When your child makes an error repeat the word back accurately to them without asking them to repeat:

Child: Mummy look at the dea

Adult: Yes, I can see the sea

If you do not understand what your child has said, encourage them to show you what they mean.
